

WROCLAW - CAPITAL OF LOWER SILESIA, POLAND

Wrocław, the capital of Poland's Lower Silesia (locally known as 'Śląsk') province is a city on the Oder River in western Poland. It is the largest city and capital of Lower Silesian Voivodeship, Poland. Wrocław is also the historic capital of Silesia. With a population close to 630,000 and a metropolitan figure well over a million, Wrocław is the fourth largest city in Poland, and is among one of the republic's major manufacturing, banking, industrial, tourist and cultural centers. Thanks to hosting events such as the Euro 2012 Championship and the 2016 European Capital of Culture, Wrocław is gaining a larger European and international profile, drawing in a growing amount of tourists for its historic city center, picturesque bridges and islands, and the city's relaxed liberal culture. The city is also known for its high quality of life. It's known for its Market Square, lined with elegant townhouses and featuring a modern fountain. Also on the square is the Gothic Old Town Hall, with its large astronomical clock. Nearby is the Panorama of Racławice, a painting depicting the 1794 battle for independence. The Centennial Hall auditorium, with its giant dome and tall spire, lies across the river.

DSYW PROJECT

Aim of the training course is to empower youth workers with information and tools, which will help them safely manage digital technologies in their organizations, as well as effectively interact online and offline with young people, especially with young people from vulnerable groups. The specific objectives:

- to strengthen capacities and knowledge of youth workers about using digital technologies for increasing social inclusion and participation in society;
- to exchange the experience, best practices and initiatives, in which information and digital security can be maintain
 to develop Guide for NGOs on ensuring digital security in youth work;
 - to raise awareness how digitalization has influence on societies, its impact on youth work and on young people;
 - to empower youth workers' understanding about the role of youth work in preventing cyber bulling, grooming, sexting and exposure to content youngsters find upsetting or shocking;
 - to reinforce critical thinking of youth workers towards informational technologies, which they will transmit to youngsters, especially to young people from vulnerable groups;
 - to know how to react to hate speech, cyber bullying and other unwanted behavior online, and to encourage young people to do so;
- to share best practices among youth workers, how to expand the horizons of young people regarding the offline life, informing them about the various possibilities of Erasmus + Program.

- How often do you use digital technologies?


- What attracts your attention? What are the main problems faced by young people?
